The Health and Behavior International Collaborative Award by the International Society of Behavioral Medicine (ISBM) and the Society for Health Psychology of the American Psychological Association

Born out of a desire to create a fluid mechanism for facilitating international collaboration between a more senior mentor and a junior trainee/ECP in behavioral medicine. The award is set up such that different professional organizations could easily join the initiative to provide an international collaboration award for their membership, and potentially attract interest from international trainees or mentors outside of their specific professional organization. \$3,000 USD. They also maintain a members directory on their website.

Research Fellowship Training Awards by Society for Psychophysiological Research

The award will allow students or postdocs to obtain mentorship/training in psychophysiological assessment/analysis with experts in the field, which they could not get at their home institution. This could involve travel to a remote site or travel expenses for a remote mentor to visit the applicant's lab. Each application may include a budget of up to \$5,000 U.S.

Research Stays for University Academics and Scientists from 1-3 months, awarded to scholars at United States or Canadian universities or research institutions who hold the Ph.D. (or equivalent) and have been working in research or teaching full time for at least two years at the time of application and after receipt of the doctorate.

Any individual who has less than five years of relevant research experience since receipt of the doctoral degree is eligible to apply to come to the NIH as a [Visiting Fellow](#). A wide number of postdoctoral training opportunities to study at NIH in the US including Japan, but also set up with India, Brazil, Russia, Quebec and Portugal.

The Japan Society for the Promotion of Science (JSPS) has, for many years, in collaboration with the Fogarty International Center of the NIH, offered two-year fellowships to Japanese citizens who wish to conduct postdoctoral research at the NIH.
